

SENECA WOMAN DIES SUDDENLY

**APOPLEXY STROKE FATAL TO
MRS. DEE WALLACE WHILE
GOING TO CHURCH**

Mrs. Christine Wallace, wife of Dee Wallace, and for many years a resident of Seneca, passed away Sunday morning shortly before ten o'clock while on her way to church. She suffered a stroke of apoplexy while walking along the street in front of the home of Rev. G. M. Foster, falling on the lawn. She was carried to the porch of the Foster home and her physician called but she passed away a few minutes later without showing any signs of recovery.

Mrs. Wallace had been in poor health for the past several years but was apparently in as good health as she had been for quite some time when she left her home. She was alone at the time she suffered the stroke.

She was born in Austria-Hungary September 20, 1879, and departed this life July 12, 1936, at the age of 56 years, 9 months and 21 days. She came to America at the age of twelve and has lived in and near Seneca since that time.

She was converted and united with the First Baptist church some 40 years ago and was active in the work of her church at all times.

She was married to Dee Wallace in 1898 and to this union four children were born, all of whom survive. They are Ercell Holmes of Wyandotte, Okla., Olga Clifton of Springfield, Mo., Forest Wallace and Florence Dooley of Seneca.

Mrs. Wallace was a kind and loving mother and a good neighbor, always ready and willing to lend a helping hand to anyone in need, and will be sadly missed by all who knew her. She leaves to mourn her departure beside her husband and children, her father, three sisters, three brothers, seven grandchildren, and many other relatives and a host of friends.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church Monday afternoon, conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. Foster. Burial was in the Seneca cemetery.
